



## Developing your ideas

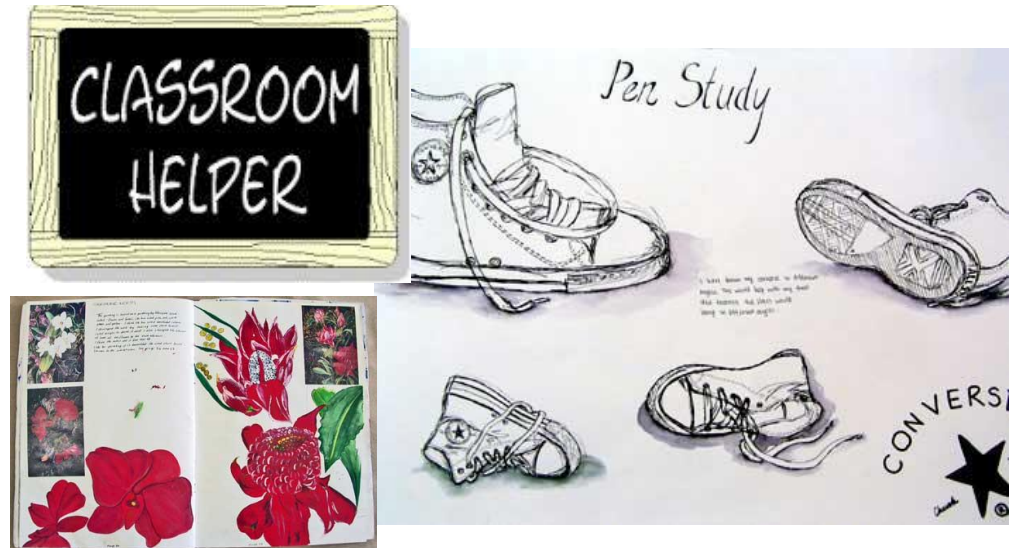
You can begin to develop your ideas once you have collected your source materials. You might have some general thoughts about what you want to do, but your ideas will change and develop as you investigate your source material. You'll need to do more research and find new source materials as your work develops.

### Working from primary sources,

you could:

- produce sketches of your subject matter in a range of media
- take rubbings or impressions from interesting surface textures
- make a 3D study from an object using clay
- take photographs, using different viewpoints and lighting conditions

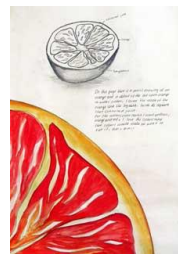
### Checklist - when developing your ideas have you:

- used both primary and secondary sources?
- worked from a variety of different sources?
- worked in a range of media appropriate to your intentions?
- selected and presented your work so that the 'journey' is clear?

Looking at the work of other artists and designers can give you a direction for your project. You might be inspired by a painter to use brush strokes and colour in a particular way, or you could use mixed media

### Drawing materials

Drawing materials include biro, fine line felt-tips, charcoal, chalk, oil pastels, drawing ink.



### Paint – Acrylic, poster paint, watercolours.

Acrylic paint can be applied thickly for an opaque layer or mixed with water for a colourwash. This is useful for glazing effects and more subtle colouring. Watercolour paint can be solid or liquid. They can be thinned with water and are good for colourwashes. William Blake combined watercolour paints with graphite and pen and ink to create the artwork on the right

### Working from secondary sources,

You could:

- interpret an image in different media. For example, a collage of a photograph.
- alter the scale or proportions of an image using ICT
- manipulate colours, tones and surfaces by using different media

**A mood page of images connected to your title.**  
Collect pictures from google images, magazines, personal photos  
Do some drawing, painting from some of these pictures.


**Examples of my chosen artist – from internet, photocopies.**  
Eg – paintings and drawings of THINGS THAT RELATE TO YOUR TITLE etc

**Colour studies my artists influence.**  
Copy sections of some artists work that you like using watercolour – poster paint, acrylic.


**3 tonal pencil / or colour studies from a primary source.**

Eg – from real objects, or your own photos

**3 tonal pencil / or colour studies from a secondary source.**

Pictures from books or the internet – do some drawings, paintings from these.


**Evidence of experimentation using different media connected to your idea.**

If you have successfully done all of the above it will put you in a position to really start thinking about what you want to do, now start experimenting

**Sketches / drawings of your proposed final idea.**

Try out a few ideas of what you are thinking as a final piece.


**Mock up of final piece, this doesn't have to be finished**

This will really give you the confidence to know exactly what you will do in the 10 hour exam.
