'bucked the national trend achieving some amazing Science results; 79% of students achieved at least 1 grade 4+, broadly equivalent to a C grade, a significant increase from 2017'

Progress matters most

- Myah made the most progress, but did not get the highest attainment 8 score. Progress was + 3.4 overachieved by 3.4 grades in every subject. (achieved 8 A/A* grades new7-9)
- Joe's average attainment was 3, and achieved a progress score of +0.9 he over achieved in 9/10 subjects
- Libby who was supported significantly by SEND had an progress score of +0.8. her attainment 2.7. over achieved in 8/10

Cognitive Ability Tests (CATs)

•These are starting **next week**, and over the course of a for a fortnight students sits x3 online tests.

•There are four areas – Verbal, Quantitative, Non Verbal and Spatial which roughly relate to Literacy, Numeracy and Flexibility of Thinking.

•We use the separate scores to help us identify any barriers to learning, and develop individual intervention plans.

•No need to revise!



Attendance

At least 95%...

"Even short breaks from school can reduce a pupil's chances of succeeding at school by as much as a quarter, according to <u>DfE analysis</u> of KS2 and KS4 attainment data for 2012/13 and absence data for that and preceding years.

'The myth that pulling a child out of school for a holiday is harmless to their education has been busted by this research,' claimed education secretary Nicky Morgan. 'Missing school can have a lasting effect on a pupil's life chances.' This is held to justify the recent legal change, restricting headteachers from granting leave from school to exceptional circumstances."



Missed School

Many pupils have an attendance rate of around 90%. Most parents and pupils think that this is pretty good. What does an attendance rate of 90% look like?

If you have a 90% attendance record, it means that you are absent from lessons for the equivalent of a half a day a week.

A 90% attendance rate means that you have missed the equivalent of 4WHOLE WEEKS of lessons in the school year.

If your attendance rate is at 90% throughout KS3 and KS4 (5 years) you have missed the equivalent of about ONE HALF OF A SCHOOL YEAR




